## Dear Parents/Carers

This week has very much been about performances at Rudgwick. Many of you will have joined us on either Wednesday or today (or possibly both) to enjoy the children showing off the many talents they have and are continually growing at school.

In Years 1, 2, 3 and 4 the children performed their termly music concerts, demonstrating all they have been learning over the spring term with the ukuleles (Years 1-3) and the clarinet (Year 4). I believe they showed the usual confidence and enjoyment as they exhibited their increased understanding of how to play these instruments and I know Mrs Eames and their teachers were very proud of them.



Today, those who attended our annual *Rudgwick Performing Arts Showcase* will have seen the range of talent our children have. We had musicians, singers and dancers all performing with confidence, collaboration, enthusiasm and, most importantly, enjoyment. ## We have been learning

Africa (Year R)	This week in Africa class we have begun to think about different types of museums and what we might find in them. We have read 'Harry and the Dinosaurs at the Museum (Ian Whybrow) and Super Silly Museums (Nick Sharratt). We are super excited to find out what might be inside Horsham museum next week! In Maths we have been learning about 3D shapes, including spheres, cylinders, cubes and cuboids. In PE with have continued to impress Coach Ben with our football skills and with Mrs Parsons we practiced throwing balls at targets. On Friday we learnt about the Muslim festival of Eid-al Fitr which is celebrated at the end of Ramadam.
Asia (Year 1)	What a great week we've had. In Maths we have been exploring counting in 2s, 5s and 10s and solving missing number questions. In English we have created front covers and blurbs for our People Who Help Us books and they look amazing. In History we have been comparing the work of Florence Nightingale, Mary Seacole and Edith Cavill, thinking about their similarities and differences. In RSHE we have been discussing keeping safe with medicine and learning about how to store our medicines safely. I'm sure you'll all agree that the children did so well during our ukulele concert – they were all shining stars and have made so much progress in just 10 weeks. We can't wait to use our new music reading skills to tackle the recorder next term!
Europe (Year 2)	What an exciting and busy week we have had in Year 2. In English we have started to read our new book The Tin Forest written by Helen Ward. So far, we have discussed the opening pages and described the dreary scene. We all hope that the story has a happy ending. The children were all really excited to perform to you and show the music skills they have learnt this term. I was extremely proud of them all as it can be quite scary playing an instrument to an audience! In Art we have started to create own our paintings and the children are really enthusiastic about mixing different shades of colour. We are keen to display the finished pictures as if we are a 'real' art gallery! Perhaps we will sign the works of art and they might be worth something in the future!
Australasia (Year 3)	Another busy week in Year 3! In English, we have been working on retelling a story as part of our Roman topic too. The children are producing some fantastic work and should be very proud of themselves. We have been continuing with fractions this week. The children loved woodland learning this week where we threaded our clay beads to make necklaces. It was a good week at swimming and the children have all made good progress since they

	started. We are also excited to work on the bookmarks in sewing and hopefully they will all be finished ready to come home next week. The highlight of our week was our music concert where we showed our musical skills to parents in playing the ukulele and singing.
Antarctica (Year 4)	A very busy and exciting week it has been in Year 4. On Tuesday, we visited Hever Castle as part of our Tudor history learning. The children really enjoyed looking around the home of Anne Boleyn and Anne of Cleves and seeing how they lived at that time. The children were excellent in their curiosity and behaviour. This formed part of our English work this week with the castle providing the stimulus for our narrative writing. In science, the children have continued to learn about the human digestive system and how it all works! In PE, the children completed their final orienteering challenge with plenty of enthusiasm. In art, the children have explored Tudor rose patterns in readiness for our printing using polystyrene tiles. Finally, it was great to see lots of you attending our music concert to hear the children play their clarinets so well.
North America (Year 5)	The penultimate week of the Spring has once again flown by. We had a fantastic day on Tuesday – PE and woodland learning. The children couldn't believe their luck! We practised the forehand stroke, recapping how to grip the racket and enjoyed a whole assortment of activities in the woods. In maths, we have started thinking how to multiply a two-digit by two-digit number and in English, finished writing our plans for a newspaper report. In computing the children created graphs linked to data from a database to answer a specific set of questions and in science, we moved our learning on to thinking about how plants can reproduce asexually, where only one parent plant is needed to create offspring. We looked at runners, tubers and bulbs and will observe over the next few weeks what this looks like.
South America (Year 6)	This week in South America class we have been learning about measurement in maths. We have looked at converting, reading scales accurately and then solving a variety of problems using these skills. In English, we have been completing our Land of Neverbelieve pieces of writing. The published pieces look amazing and the writing is of really high quality. In science, we have looked at how living things have changed over time and in geography we have analysed how borders have changed over time and thought about the reasons why. In PE we have learnt more skills in gymnastics ready to use in our sequences next week and in art we have started printing out final pieces and finishing off carving our lino blocks.
