It has been another busy week at school!

During the workshops, children learnt all about the differences between the lives of animals in the wild and those kept in captivity, completing a range of activities such as a movement piece, diary writing, group drama and meditation, in order to help the children to think about whether they felt it is better for animals to be in the wild or in captivity.

# We have been learning

Africa (Year R)	This week we were excited to find tiny caterpillars had arrived in our classroom. We have been watching them all week and we can't believe how much they have grown already. We have even seen them starting to make silk! We have been looking at life-cycles of butterflies and frogs and we are able to record these changes with drawings and words. In PE we are continuing to practise for sports day. We have been practising our throwing and balancing skills. We are all looking forward to the big day next week. In Maths we have focused on odd and even numbers. Mrs Worth is
Asia (Year 1)	amazed how confident we all are with identifying odd and even numbers. This week has been all things phonics. We have had a great time playing phonics games, creating our own alien words and spotting phonemes around the classroom. All the children worked so hard in their Phonics Screening Check and should be extremely proud of their efforts. In Maths we have been exploring time, identifying o'clock and half past on a clock on an analogue clock. In English we have begun creating the first section of our fact files on British animals, thinking about their appearance. In Art we have been exploring watercolour and using our painting skills to add colour to our sunflower sketches. In PE we have been limbering up for Sports Day, practising our events for the big day next week!
Europe (Year 2)	Year 2 have spent this week thinking about the future! We have shared and enjoyed our core book 'Oh, the places you'll go!' by Dr. Seuss and have used it to think about where we might like to go in the future. We planned and wrote mini books that included where we will go, what we will bring and why we will be there. This helped us develop our skills in writing about

Australasia (Year 3)	personal experience. In maths, we explored word problems involving volume. We are getting so good at word problems now! In science, we learned about germs and the scientist Louis Pasteur. In PE, we played tag rugby with Coach Marcus and had so much fun! In DT, we researched recipes and discussed the ingredients we might need to make our own. We can't wait for next week and sports day and hope to see you all there! We've enjoyed tag-rugby sessions, experienced a Born Free Foundation workshop, played on recorders and learnt to tell time to the minute. Even though there are only 25 school days left in the academic year, year 3 are showing no sign of slowing down. They are still enthusiastic to learn new things, take on fresh challenges and refine small elements which distinguish good pieces of work from great ones. In writing they have learnt to use apostrophes of possession and apply expanded noun phrases to make formal sentences more engaging. In reading, the class have reached the penultimate chapter of our shared read - waiting for the last instalment when we discover what becomes of Bear and our protagonist. In RE we have considered people we feel are role models for their religion and showcase what it means to follow the golden rule and make society a better, kinder, fairer place.
Antarctica (Year 4)	Another busy week in Year 4 again with lots of great learning taking place. In maths, the children have been learning about reading, writing and translating points on a grid with great success. In English, children have continued to really enjoy reading the Explorer and using it to inspire their journal writing to describe events that have happened to the key characters. The children enjoyed publishing on tea stained paper. In science, children concluded their learning on electricity by researching the life of Thomas Edison. In geography, children used the story of the Shaman's Apprentice to support their research into how the tribes of the rainforest use it sustainably. Our PE this week gave the children an opportunity to practise their throwing skills ready for Sports Day next week. They children also enjoyed a day of workshops about animal conservation delivered by the Born Free Animal Charity.
North America (Year 5)	A chillier but equally enjoyable second week back for North America. In maths, we explored line graphs that showed different data sets and thought carefully about how we can interpret the information. We start writing a letter in English, using the persuasive techniques we looked at last week. The letter is written from the perspective of the ocean to humanity collectively, trying to convince them to treat the environment in a way that creates better balance. In PE, we had another great sports leadership session with Mr Meaney and also practised track and field for sports day. In RSHE last week, we had an introduction to puberty and what that means with regard to the changes they might expect over the coming years. We followed up this week with discussion around questions they asked anonymously linked to the first session. The children also enjoyed a workshop delivered by Born Free, a wildlife charity, promoting the benefits of conservation.
South America (Year 6)	These weeks seem to be whizzing by already! In maths we have been learning all about finances and thinking about how to manage them and what budgeting is. We played a game to set up a realistic scenario of managing money month by month. In English we have continued to write our persuasive letters about water and have been publishing them. In science, we have started our final topic all about the circulatory system and focused on the heart and in PE we have been preparing for sports day by honing our sprinting technique and javelin skills. Our highlight of the week

	was definitely the visit from Born Free on Thursday, where we took part in some very interesting workshops about the work they do to help conserve animals in the wild.
