Dear Parents and Carers

We started this week with the exciting news that our Gymnastics team, who were competing on Sunday, have brought more success to Rudgwick Primary School. In the regional entry our girls managed both a 1st (Bree and Knysna) and 2nd (Norah and Molly) place finish. And our boys (Kai and William) finished first in the national entry and have qualified for the national finals later this year in Stoke. It is great to see the gymnastics legacy continuing in such a successful way and that AT Gym Club is going strong. Well done to the whole team and we can't wait to find out how the boys get on in April. We are very proud of you all.



Tuesday was Safer Internet Day, a special celebration that takes place in February of each year to raise awareness of a safer and better internet for all, and especially for children and young people. All of the children took part in a variety of activities which focused on this year's theme of 'Inspiring change? Making a difference, managing influence and navigating change online'. And the children in Years 1 – 5 also took part in a drama workshop led by One Day Creative. The younger children enjoyed the 'Cyber Heroes' workshop, which focused on online gaming and created their very own special 'cyber hero' identities. The older children took part in the 'Game Over' workshop, creating their own avatar and exploring themes such as online bullying, age-related content, in-app purchases and the impact of excessive screen time. The children were fully engaged in the workshops, having fun and reflecting on some very important messages.







Woodland Learning has continued to enthuse our children this term for the great outdoors. This week the children, as well as enjoying their usual exploration of our woodland area, made a very tasty vegetable soup (thank you Year 1 for letting me try some!).













A busy week got even busier on Wednesday when author, David Fuller, joined us in school. David spent time visiting the children in Years 3, 4 and 5, telling them all about his life as an author, the work that it takes to plan, write and publish a book and about how difficult he found it to be a writer when he was in primary school. The children were fascinated, listening intently and asking David some very interesting questions. David loved spending the day with us and thought the children a great audience and who knows, there could be some authors of the future sitting among them!









We took part in a locality Basketball tournament this week as well. The tournament, held at The Weald, was for Year 5 and 6 children but with our Year 6 children away on residential, it was left to a team of Year 5 children to fly the flag for Rudgwick. Competing against mostly Year 6 children from other schools they did remarkably well, finishing in a very respectable

joint 3rd place. What stood out to me was not where they finished, but their attitude to the event. They threw themselves into the competition and enjoyed every second of it. We are now looking forward to hearing which book wins across all of the schools in the county, with the winner being announced in March. In Maths this week we have been learning about double numbers and have
	amazed all of our teachers with how well we can tell you about them. On Friday, we celebrated Chinese New Year by making Chinese dragons and lanterns. Mrs Worth wishes us all a restful and happy half-term break.
Asia (Year 1)	How is it half term already? What a great last week we have had. The children worked really hard on finishing their bakery posters and have created a short comic strip of a conversation they might have in their bakeries with their customers. We had such a fun time role playing these scenes in our role play bakery. We had such a nice last woodland learning session with Mrs Weller and Keith, enjoying soup we made over the fire. In Maths we have been representing numbers making posters, showing off all that we know from our half term of learning. In history we are learning what happened after the great fire and how London changed when it was rebuilt. Mrs Hoyte would like to say thank you for all the good wishes and messages of support – we can't wait to hear all about how she got on with her epic run! We hope all have a wonderful and relaxing half term.

(Year 3)	time has flown by really quickly. This week, we have been writing non-chronological reports about dinosaur anatomy and developing our understanding of fronted adverbials. In maths, we have been adding amounts of money and sharpening our recall of timestables. In art, we have been adding the paintwork to our dragon eyes and enjoying drama and games to help us to ensure our time online is safe as well as fun. In science we have explored friction and in geography we used a variety of maps to better understand what makes the country we live in distinctive.
Antarctica (Year 4)	Wow! Well done all in Year 4, as another half term packed full of new learning has flown by and we have reached the mid-point of the year. In maths, we have continued our learning with fractions by finding a fraction of a given amount and then using this knowledge to solve word challenges. In the children had the opportunity to meet an author and listened brilliantly as he shared his writing approach to his books with them. They also have continued reading Varjak Paw and presented their persuasive letters. In Science, the children have worked on developing their questioning skills linked with sound. A wonderful time was had in Woodland Learning where the children enjoyed making and tasting vegetable soup. It was Safer Internet Day this week and the children enjoyed a workshop thinking about being safe with online gaming. Have a lovely Half Term!

David Fuller, a young-fiction author, came to Rudgwick and spoke to the class about his writing journey, read extracts of his different books and gave top tips for aspiring authors. The children asked some superb questions during the Q&A and can hopefully apply some of David's wisdom to their own practice. Beyond our visitors, the children painted their sculptures inspired by Alberto Giacometti which look fantastic. In maths, we considered how to use our understanding of equivalent fractions to order fractions with different denominators and in science, the children enjoyed testing their parachutes during an investigation into air resistance.
